WIDOW'S APPLICATION FOR PENSION.

STATE OF LOUISIANA,

PARISH OF East Feliciana

On this 10th day of September, 1907, personally appeared before me, J. L. Craven, Clerk of the District Court, within and for said Parish and State, Mrs. Malvina A. Andrews, aged 56 years, a resident of the City of New Orleans, Parish of Orleans, and State of Louisiana, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of Thomas J. Andrews, who entered the service of the Confederate States during the civil war under the name of Thomas J. Andrews, at New Orleans, on the 4th day of September, 1864, in the 4th La. Reg. Infantry from the state of Louisiana, that he served honorably until August 1864, and that he remained true to the Confederate States until the surrender, at which time he was in Louisiana, as Malvina A. Davis, that she was married to the said soldier under the name of Malvina A. Davis on the 4th day of December, 1873, by Rev. James A. Gidney at Clinton, La., that she has not married again, and that she is now in indigent circumstances and unable to earn a livelihood by her own labor or skill, that she is not married or otherwise provided for by the State of Louisiana or by any other State or Government; that her said husband died on the 12th day of April, 1862, at Clinton, La., that she has resided in the State of Louisiana for 5-6 years next preceding the date of this application, and that she claims the aid and benefit of Act No. 73 of 1900 as is further shown by her answers to the following questions which she swears to be true and correct:

1. Under what circumstances did your husband die?

Answer: Rheumatism contracted in army

2. Where is he buried?

Answer: West end of Clinton cemetery near my home

3. What are your means of support?

Answer: Nothing particularly, what I can make

4. What is the value of your property, real and personal, if any?

Answer: Nothing

5. Have you conveyed property to any one in the past few years?

Answer: Sold a small lot in Clinton in past two years

6. If any. How much and to whom conveyed?

Answer: To C. D. Smith for \$250.00

7. Give your post office address and that of your two witnesses.
