



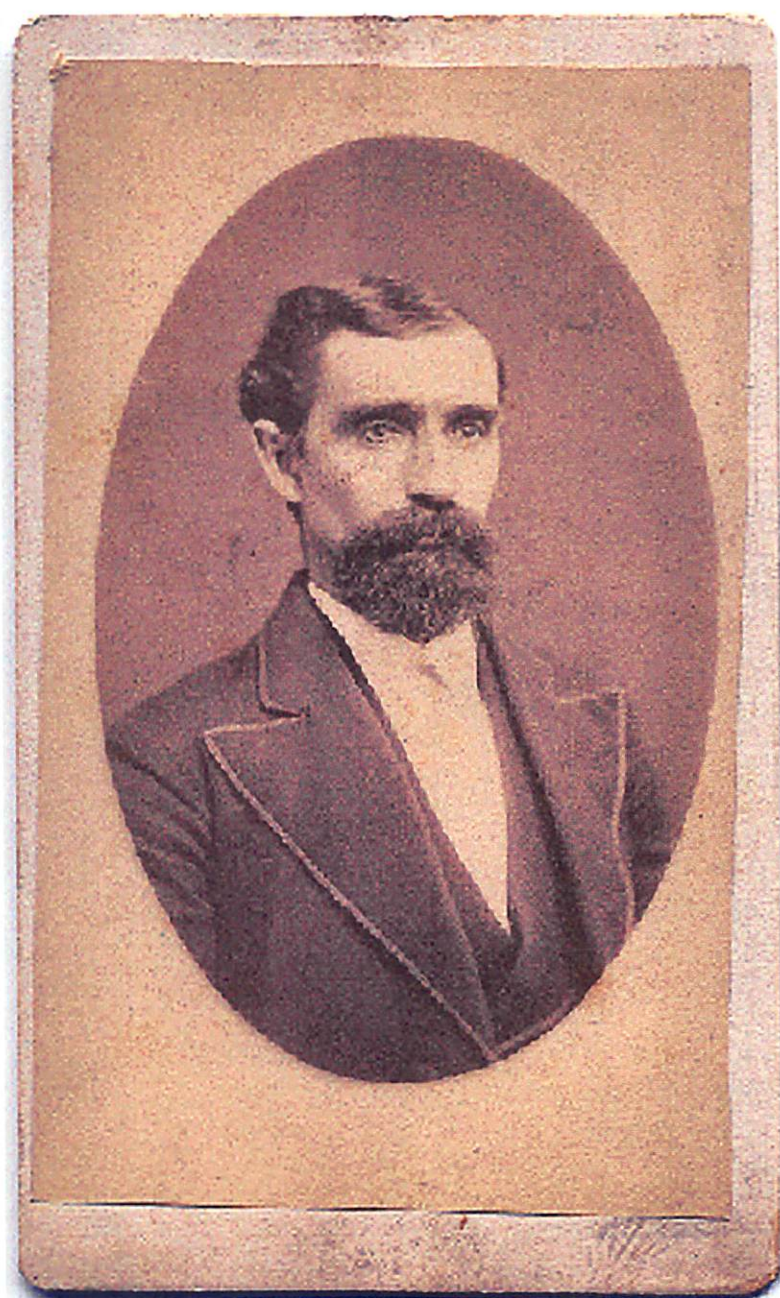

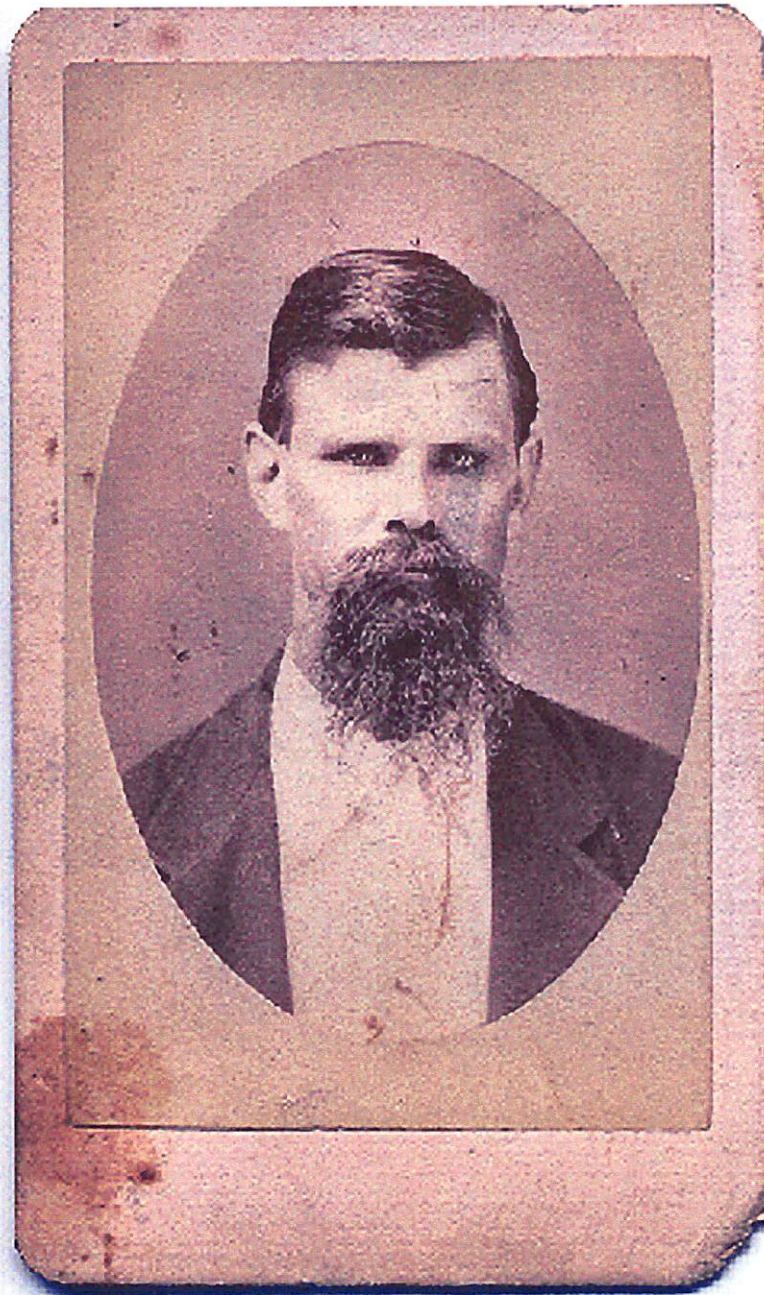

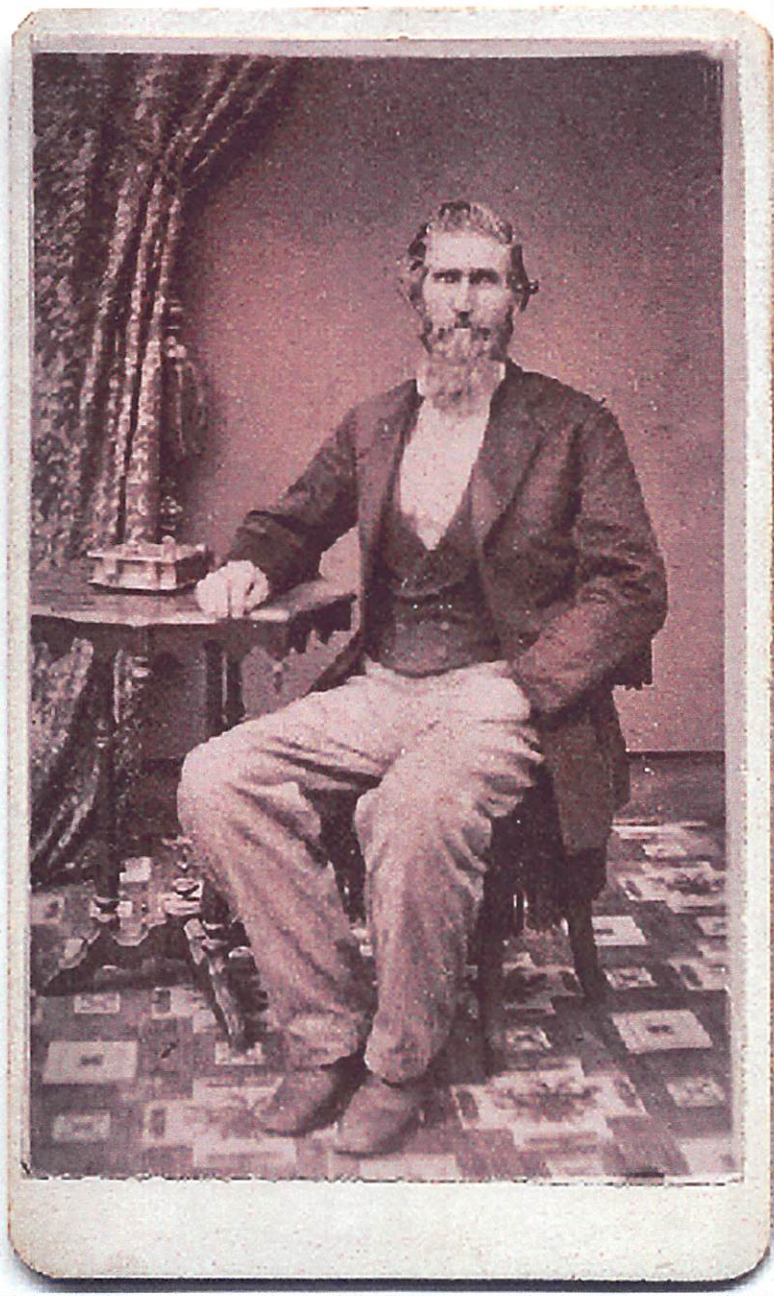

This was the picture that had the picture card marked "Blackmon".

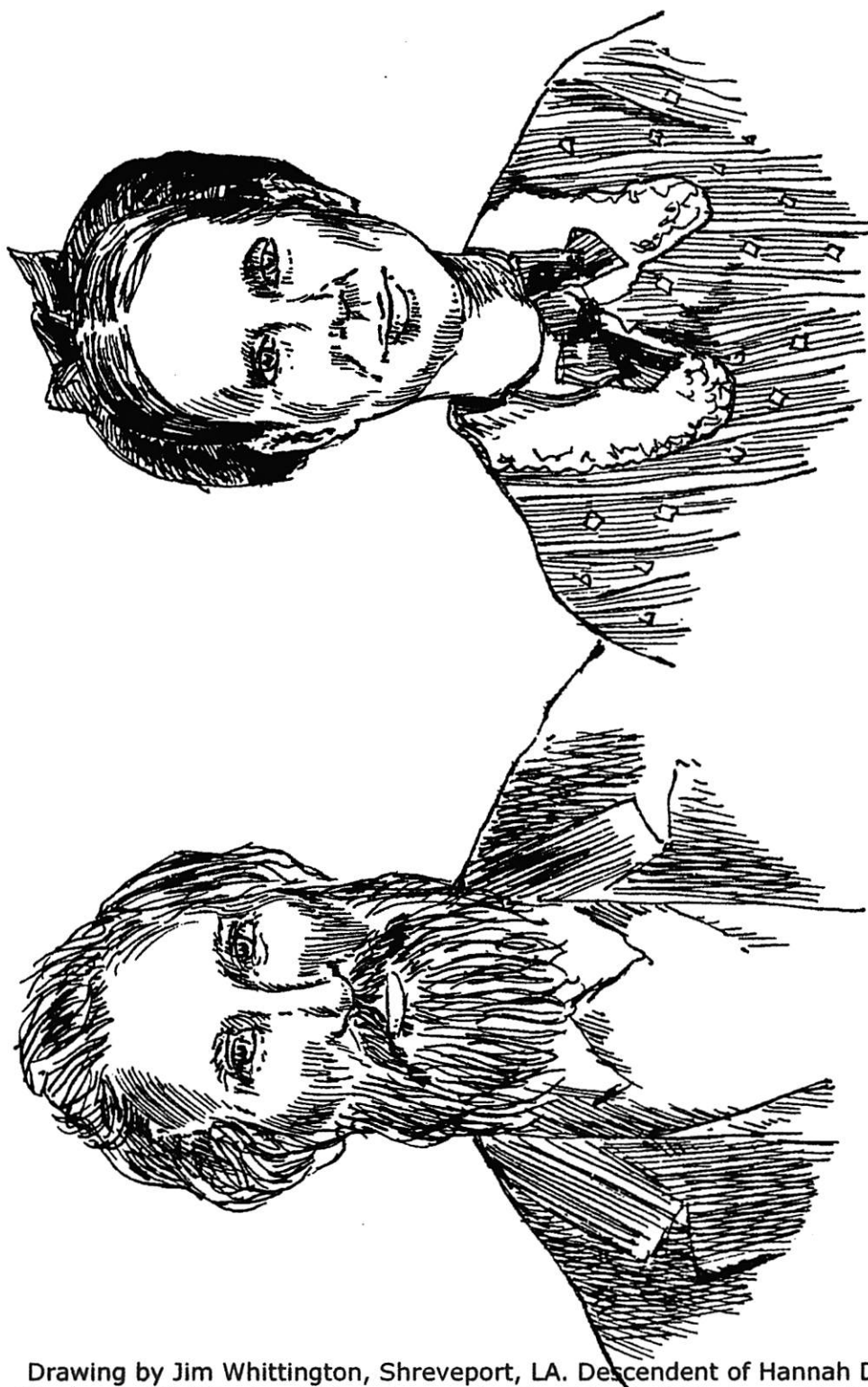






This style of tie, vest and coat were in fashion in the 1850's.

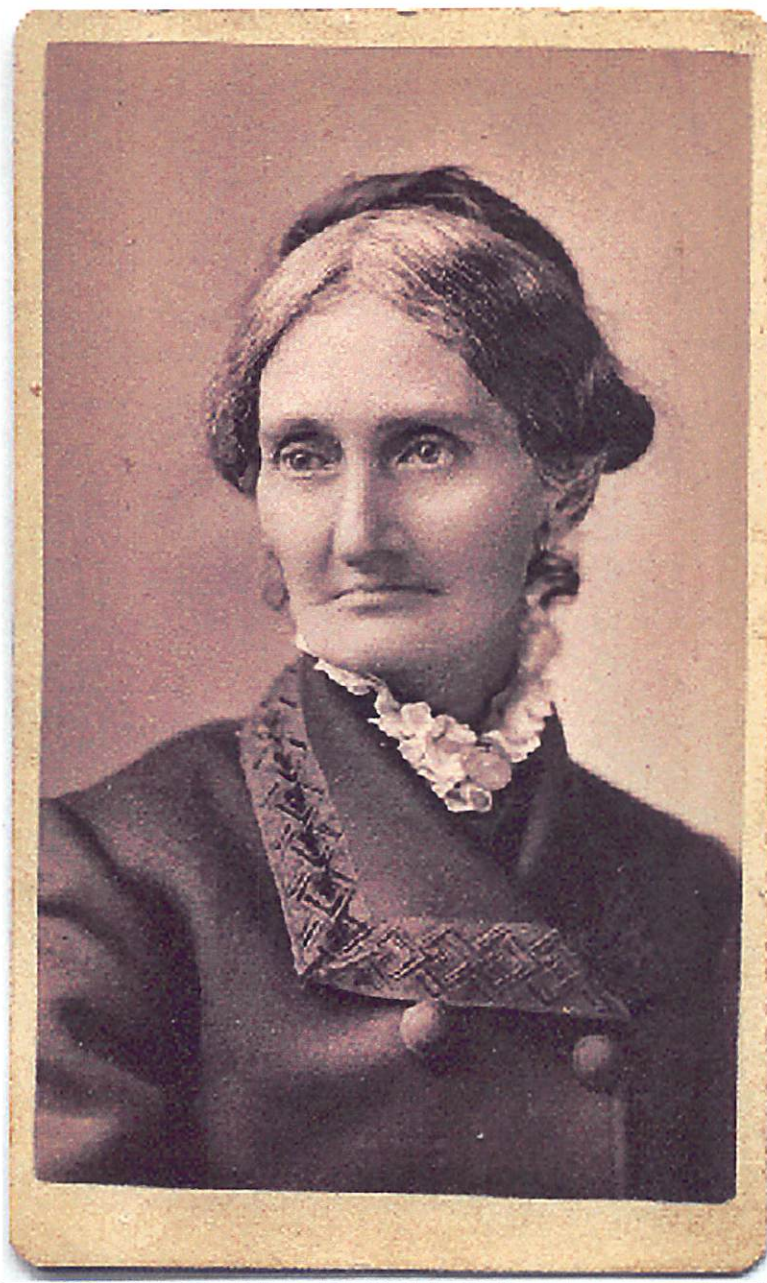

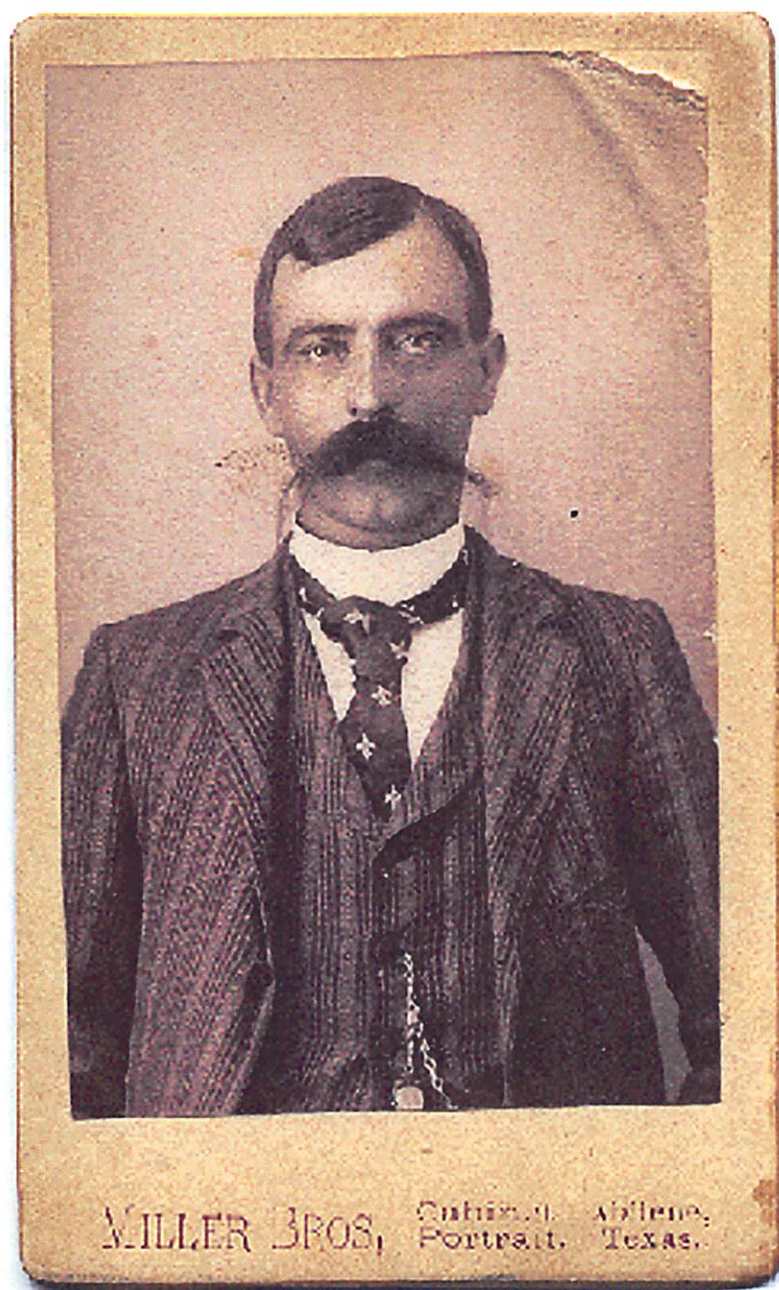


These long neck/watch chains were in style in the early 1860's.

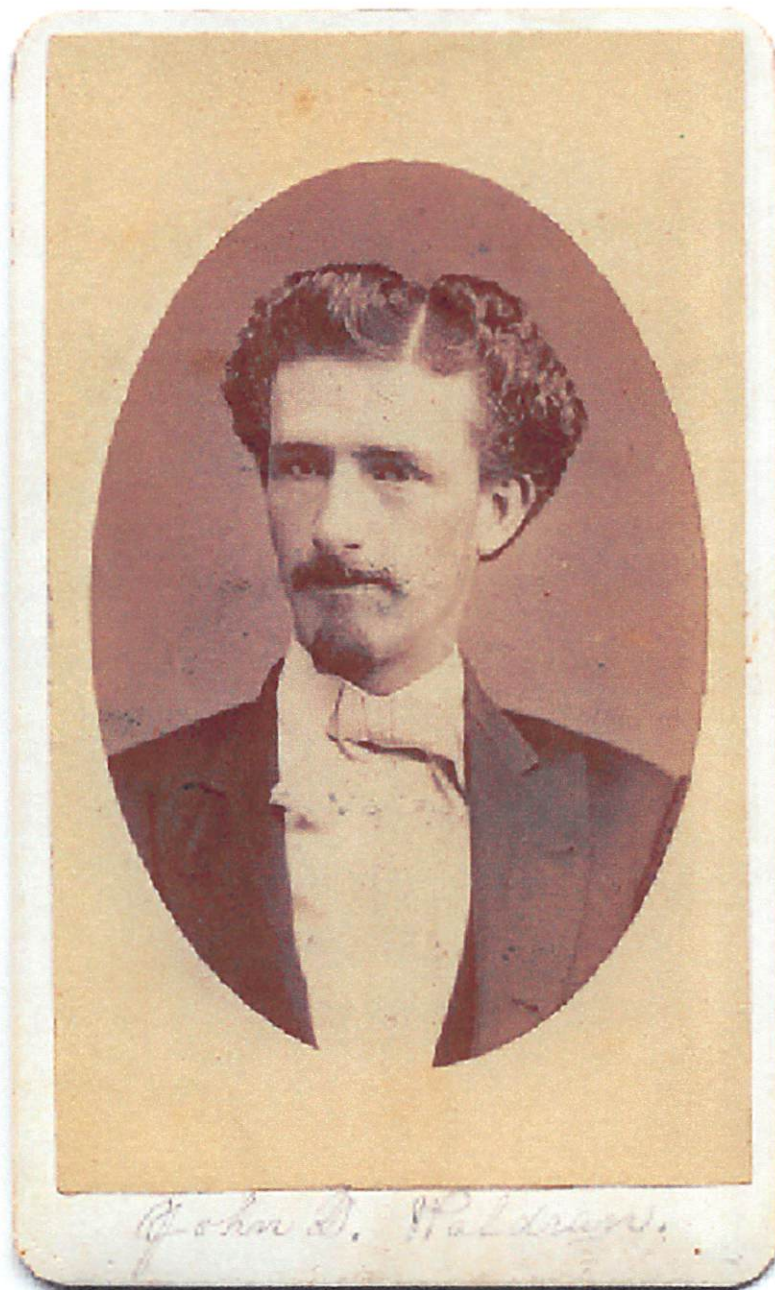

This picture is marked "John D. Waldron. . This is a member of Mary Waldron Dockery's family. Mary's father (we presume) signed her marriage bond as F. W. Waldron. Could this be for "Fletcher" W. Waldron?







The card holder for this picture said "Granny Dockery". This may be Blackmon's wife, Mary Waldran Dockery, b. 1827-d. 1891. One fact to consider is that the picture was taken in Shreveport, LA. Was this just before they left for Texas? Mary was 43 yrs. old in 1870 when she moved from Shreveport to Throckmorton County, TX.

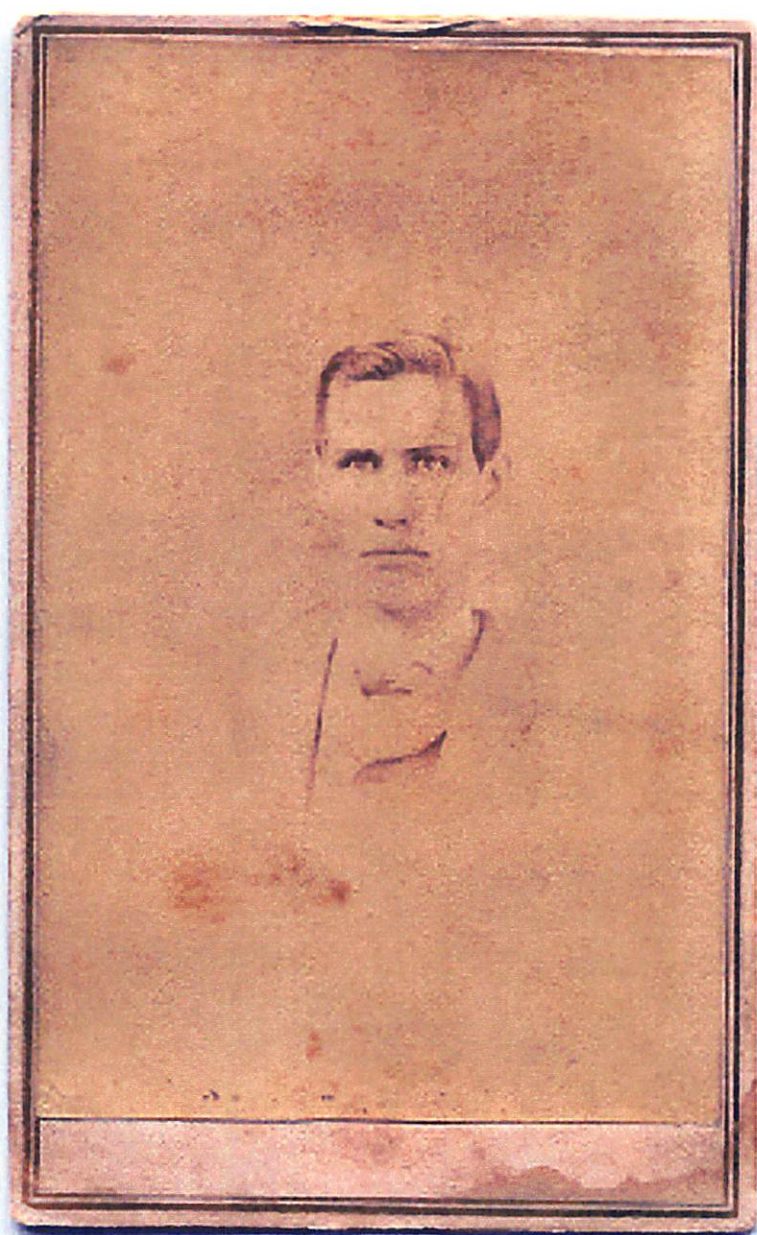

From the hair style and collar on the dress, I think this was taken in the early 1860's.











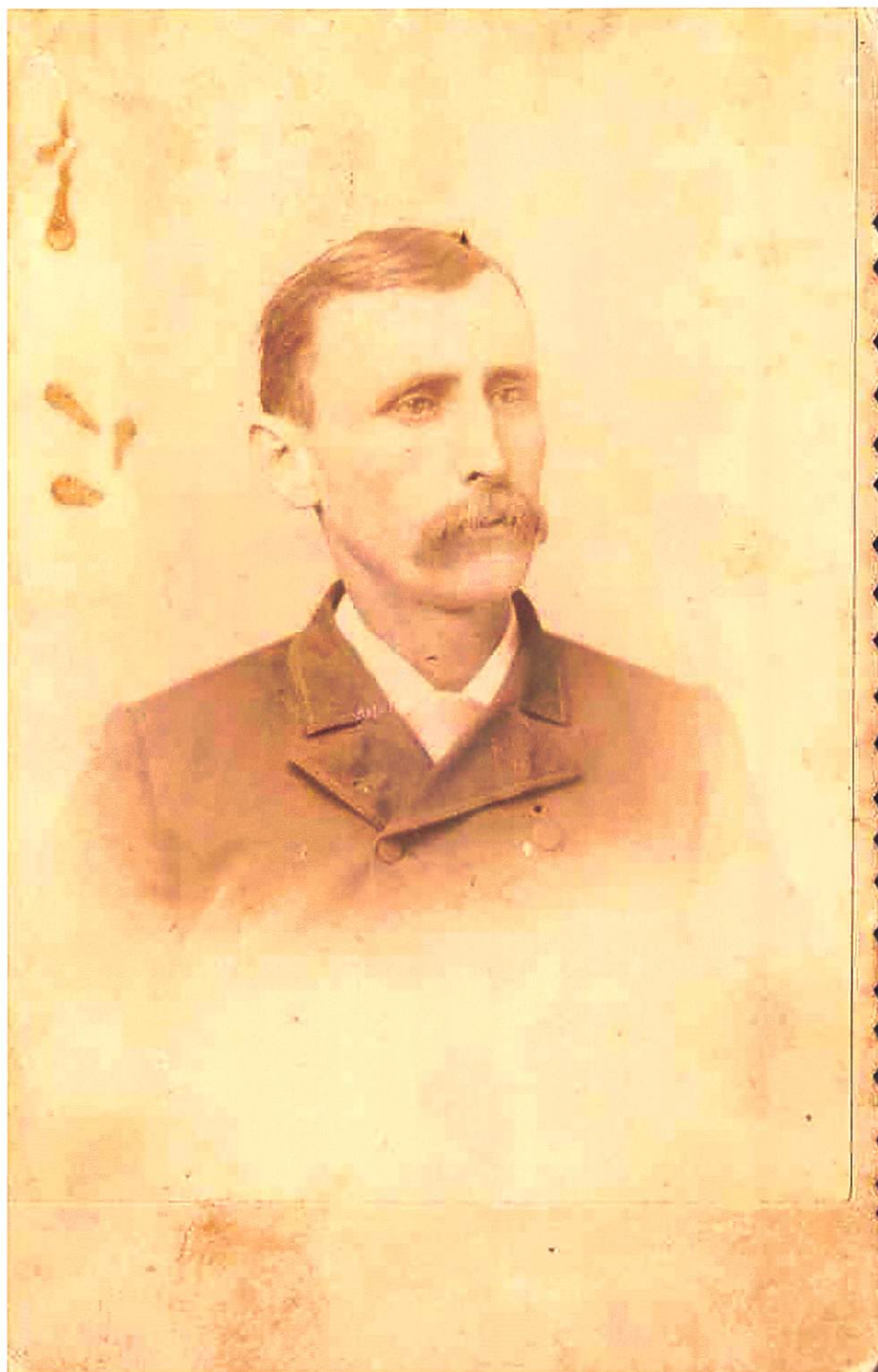

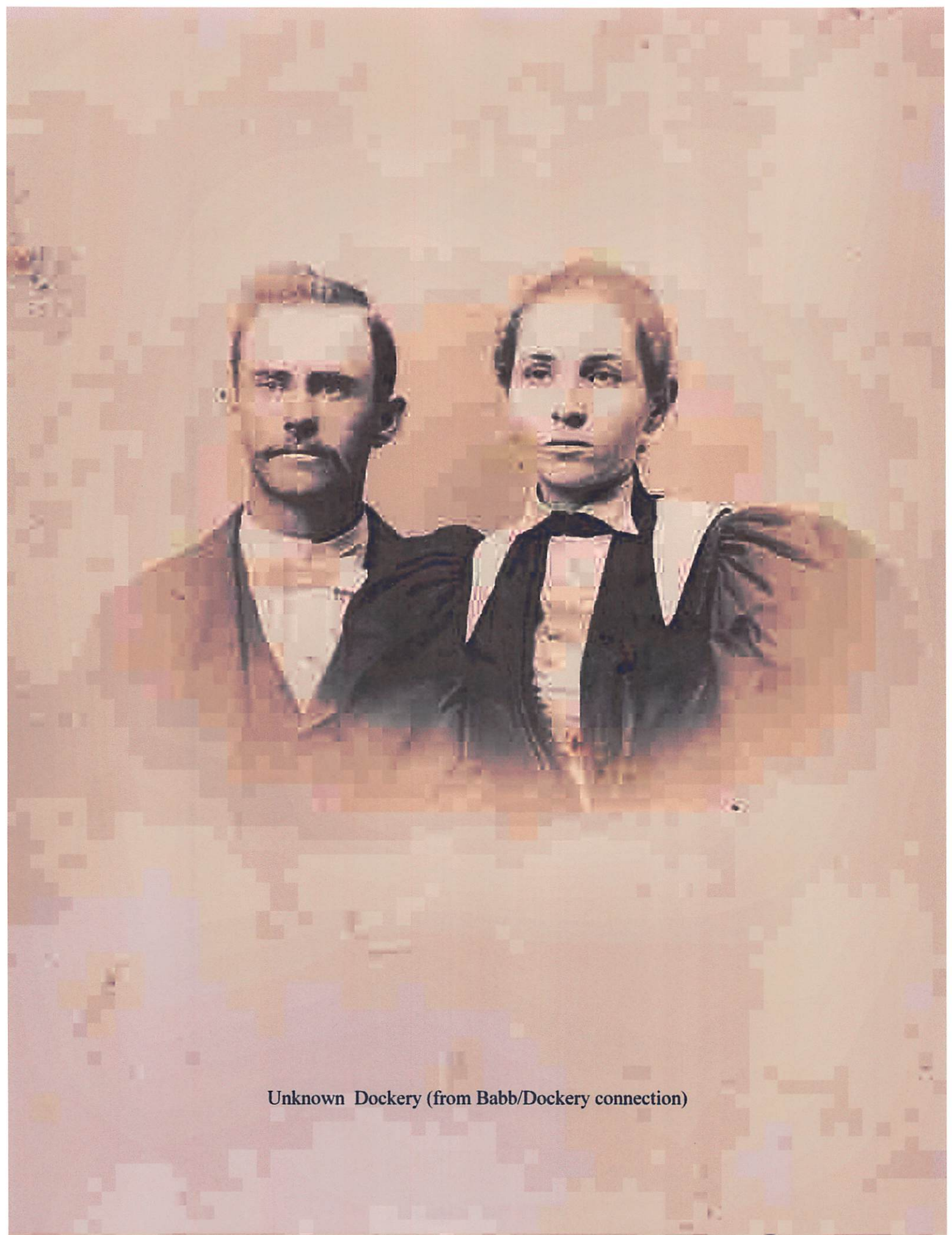
